Center for Veteran's Engagement Receives Grant

The Center for Veteran's Engagement at William and Mary received its first grant from WCF this fall. The Veterans Writing Groups (VWG) offer free, monthly creative writing sessions to service members, veterans, and military family members of all writing backgrounds and skill levels. Group members complete writing prompts and receive feedback during meetings, share their work with fellow members for comments and criticism between sessions, publish in blogs and journals, compete in writing contests, and attend guest speaker events.

The grant from WCF provides a stipend so that the program can hire professional writing instructors to work with veterans on their writing projects. The program provides a therapeutic benefit to veterans without the perceived stigma typically associated with therapy. It also connects our local veterans with other members of the community fostering improved understanding among W&M students, faculty, community members and the veterans themselves. Women & Girls Fund Awards Grant

We live in a world where women's roles have expanded to encompass every facet of society from first responders to wall street wizards to college presidents. And yet, there is one role that can still bring anxiety and/or depression even to the most accomplished among us; motherhood. During pregnancy and the first year after giving birth perinatal mood and anxiety disorders often referred to as post partum depression affect up to 1 in 5 new or expectant mothers and their families. These illnesses – also known as , or PMADs — are the #1 complication of pregnancy and child-birth.

Women of every culture, age, income level, and race can develop PMADs. Symptoms can appear anytime during the



two-year span from conception through baby's first birthday. Onset of symptoms may be gradual or sudden. One group in Virginia is working to help women who are experiencing this problem.

Postpartum Support of VA, Inc. recently received its first grant from WCF from the Williamsburg Fund for Women and Girls. The grant will help the organization spread the word throughout our area about resources available in our community for women experiencing PMADs. A support group meets at the Williamsburg Regional Library on Scotland Street, 2nd Tuesday morn-
